 80,000 members across the country; 2,000 in Minnesota


 People from all backgrounds and life stages

# **Common Terms**

### For AmeriCorps Programs




- Program the grant funded activities
- Member the person enrolled in AmeriCorps and serving in the program
- Service Site the location where the member serves
- Term of Service number of hours a member committed to serve in order to successfully complete the program (7 available from 100 – 1700 hours)
- Living Allowance the stipend an AmeriCorps member receives while actively serving (FT range \$18,700 – \$37,400)
- Education Award the funds a member earns if they successfully complete (FY24 – FT \$7,395)



# **Common Terms**

#### For the Application Process



- Fiscal Host the organization that writes the grant and houses the program once the grant is awarded
- Theory of Change a clear explanation of why you do the things you do, given what you hope to accomplish
- Logic Model visual representation of the applicant's Theory of Change
- Performance Measures the measurable outputs and outcomes that result from delivering the program
- MSY Member Service Year which is a full-time equivalent
- Cost per MSY the amount of federal AmeriCorps funds an applicant will receive per MSY (\$25,000/MSY max)
- Matching Funds the amount of additional funds required in order to receive the federal funds. Starts at 24%. Cash and in-kind.



# **Theory of Change**

A clear explanation of why you do the things you do, given what you hope to accomplish.

A program theory explains how and why a program is supposed to work.

It provides a logical and reasonable description of why the things you do – your program activities – should lead to the intended results or benefits. IF/THEN statements can be helpful.

A successful theory is based on underlying evidence about what makes programs successful and how change occurs.

A logic model can use arrows to show that one thing leads to the next, but your program theory needs to lay out the evidence to show WHY you believe one thing will lead to the next.




# **Logic Model**


# COLLEGE POSSIBLE STUDENTS ARE 4 TIMES MORE LIKELY


- **Required** your organization must have an active SAM.gov listing
- Not all narrative sections are weighted the same
- Your budget should reflect what you wrote about in the narrative section
- The Source of Funds section of the budget should equal the matching funds listed and include pending/secured
- Your performance measure(s) should reflect your primary activity -check the AmeriCorps national performance measures for possible alignment
- Page Limits 10 for narratives and 8 for Togic model
- Funded evidence levels from last year: strong 25%, moderate 12%, preliminary 20% and pre-preliminary 43%
